



Attendance Comment

In South Australia, all children and young people must be in school from 6 years to 16 years old. They must attend a government or non-government school full time. From age 16 to 17 however, young people must attend school or an approved learning program (such as an apprenticeship, traineeship, accredited course or university). Schools and parents must encourage and support students to come to school every day. Parents and caregivers must make sure their child is enrolled in a school, and attends school all day and everyday it is open, unless a child is sick or has an approved exemption. Teachers and leaders actively follow up when a student misses school, including recording all absences and non-attendance. All schools in South Australia have local attendance procedures governed under the Education and Children's Services Regulations 2020.

The Governing Council currently has 6 members (4 parents, one community member and the school principal). Fundraising

Fundraising for this year has been an Easter raffle, Wonderwhite bread bag promotion, bamboo toothbrushes and a Christmas raffle (which is still in progress). The Easter raffle seems to be the yearly favourite, lots of donations came in resulting in twelve fabulous prizes. Losing \$200.00 of Easter raffle sales from the school break in was the only downside.

The Wonderwhite Bread Bag promotion resulted in 3 boxes filled which gave the school 1800 points. These points were used to 'purchase' a dodgeball, netball, soccer ball, rugby ball, football, basketball, soft fluro volleyball and a plastic bocce set which used 1761 points. Delivery of the balls arrived in week 7 of term 4.
